Trustees' Report

ACHIEVEMENTS

The Board of Directors is delighted to report the following key achievements for 2009:

- A significant growth in membership of 6%, with 12,069 members in 2009 compared with 11,421 in 2008.
- An increase of 15% in Engineering Council registrations.
- Commendation by the Engineering Council in achieving the highest possible rating for quality assurance processes. The report concluded that the IFE is a well run Institution with good processes and procedures and has been identified by the Engineering Council as a model of good practice in a number of areas.
- Highly successful teamwork between the IFERG Membership Committee, staff and the fire safety contracting industry has aligned competency standards with the requirements of EngTech registration. Such was the resultant demand, that a separate Engineering Technician Sub-Group (ETSG) has been established and a programme of training events to support new peer reviewers put in place.
- The successful registration of 6 IFE qualifications on the National Database of Qualifications.
- An increase in IFE examinations to 5,200 of which almost 2,500 were provided to those working in the UK Fire & Rescue Service.
- The establishment of a research event partnership with the Fire Service College, to offer a subsidised annual event to encourage knowledge sharing.
- Successful delivery of the Fire & Rescue 2009 conference, in partnership with the Chief Fire Officers' Association and the Fire Protection Association
- The support of members through economic downturn by placing a freeze on all fees and subscriptions for one year.
- A broad range of professional development opportunities through conferences, lectures, international networking events and technical consultations. Successes included a highly engaging *BS9999 – One Year On* event, feedback from which informed recommendations sent to both the British Standards Institution (BSI) and the department of Communities and Local Government (CLG).
- A strengthened and active Technical Strategy Advisory Group (TSAG), providing coordinated responses to consultations, peer reviewing technical articles submitted to *Fire Risk Management* and coordinating IFE representation on working groups and committees on technical matters.

The achievements outlined above are in addition to improvements in the communication structure. The flow of information between the Board, Branches and Head Office has been greatly enhanced by the invitation made to the Leader of the International General Assembly, Neil Gibbins, to join Board Directors in their meetings so that information can be relayed first hand to Branch representatives and opinions sought at the same time. This is a major step forward and strengthens the vital communications link between the Board and the International General Assembly.

As a responsible professional organisation, the Institution endeavours to protect the environment by reducing hardcopy printing where practicable. The Institution's journal *Fire Risk Management* is available to members online, but we do still print and distribute hard copies to members as we are conscious that online facilities may not be readily accessible to some. However, as we move forward we welcome further discussions on this through the International General Assembly.



Financial Review

The Institution continues to achieve a positive financial outcome, having increased its income by 39% over 5 years, from £664,500 in 2005 to £922,865 in 2009. For 2009 the total income of £922,865 represented an increase of 11% on income achieved in 2008 of £831,017. Whilst expenditure increased by £139,244 to £864,730, much of this additional cost was due to extraordinary items and the filling of staffing vacancies to strengthen the position of the Institution.

Over the last 5 years, membership has increased substantially and has exceeded 12,000 members. It is satisfying to see that membership has continued to grow significantly with a 6% increase achieved in 2009 compared with the previous year. However, in parallel, financial risk to the Institution has been reduced by implementing a strategic policy of income diversification. Progress in this area has been significant:

- In 2008, subscription income from membership accounted for 58% of total income; in 2009, subscription income accounted for 56%.
- Income from examinations in 2008 represented 12% of total income; by 2009 examination income accounted for 20% of income.

The Institution makes a social investment in IFE (Publications) Limited each year to cover the costs of the journal.

Overall the Institution has achieved a consolidated surplus position in 2009 of £58,135.

Risk Review

The Board is mindful of its responsibility to identify and address the major risks to which the charity is exposed and the need to have in place systems and procedures to manage those risks. During 2006, the Directors undertook a professionally facilitated review of the major risks that faced the organisation. This valuable exercise identified and ranked in terms of importance a number of key areas where the Institution needed to become more resilient. During 2008 and 2009 strategy was targeted to address the major risks identified and this has been highly effective, with levels of risk reduced considerably across all key areas. The Board reviews progress against identified risks each year and considers new risks, prioritising each to inform strategic decisions and policy.



Board Policy and Strategy

The Board is responsible to the members for the conduct and performance of the Institution and decisions relating to strategy and policy. On appointment, all Board Directors are assigned portfolio responsibilities for specific areas of IFE activity. As portfolio holders, Board Directors work with relevant members of the staff team to set objectives and develop work programmes for the short, medium and longer term. The Board Chair is appointed by the Board and works with the Chief Executive Officer on strategic financial management and business development.

The Board as a whole is responsible for annual review of risk, setting strategy, reviewing policy, approving the budget and overseeing financial performance. The day-to-day running of the IFE and IFE Publications Limited is delegated by the Board to the staff team under the leadership of the Chief Executive Officer who also acts as Company Secretary.

The Board meets five times each year and provision is made for additional time to review and develop strategy. The Board also meets with the international General Assembly of Branch Representatives which provides a welcome forum for discussion and development. Through partnership working between the Board and the International General Assembly, proposals continue to be openly debated and successfully implemented, such as the recent amendments to the eligibility criteria for Student membership, which came to the Board from a proposal made by members of the International General Assembly. The Board wishes to extend its thanks to all those supporting the work of the Institution in their local branches. The branch structure is run on the basis of federated status, each branch established as autonomous organisations, but affiliated to the IFE. Without doubt one of the clear strengths of the IFE is its worldwide branch network through which members are provided with a wealth of opportunities to network and share good practice.

It is important that, as a charity, we ensure that membership is not restrictive; any member of the public interested in the Institution's work can apply to become an Affiliate member and may then choose to develop their knowledge and skills and progress to higher levels of membership. Moreover, a proactive approach continues to be taken to encourage members to progress through grades of membership and to provide clearer guidance and advice to support this important aspect of professional development.

Without doubt, the major activities of the IFE – membership, qualifications, Engineering Council registration, fire risk auditors and assessors registration, and technical CPD opportunities – would not be possible without the hard work and dedication of the very many member volunteers and partner organisations who support the IFE.

The successes of the IFE in recent years have been truly remarkable. We have moved from substantial deficit to healthy surplus, from over-reliance on a single source of income to robust income diversification and membership has grown substantially. Whilst we do not underestimate the challenges ahead, we can move forward with increased confidence. As a Board we would like to thank all members, staff and partners organisations, all of whom have contributed to a highly successful year of which we can be truly proud.
